The year is 2525 A.D., an age when mankind is moving out among the stars.

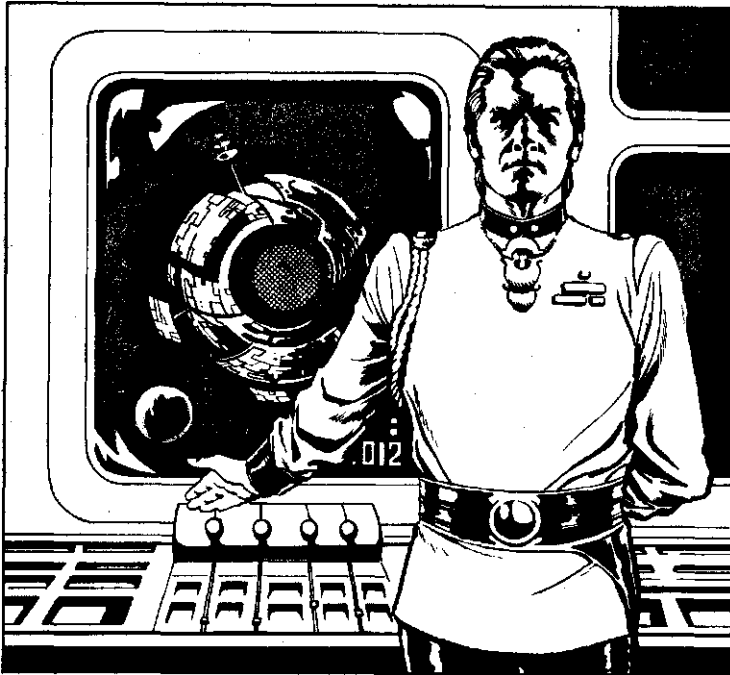

If you want to go as a tourist, turn to page 6.

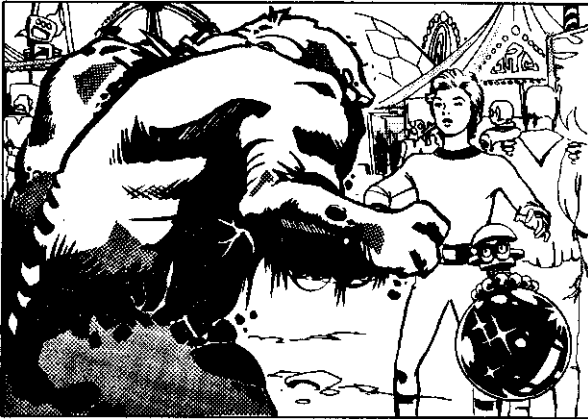

Then the "garbage" grabs you in an iron embrace. "Mungoids!" says 2-Tor. "Galactic thugs!"



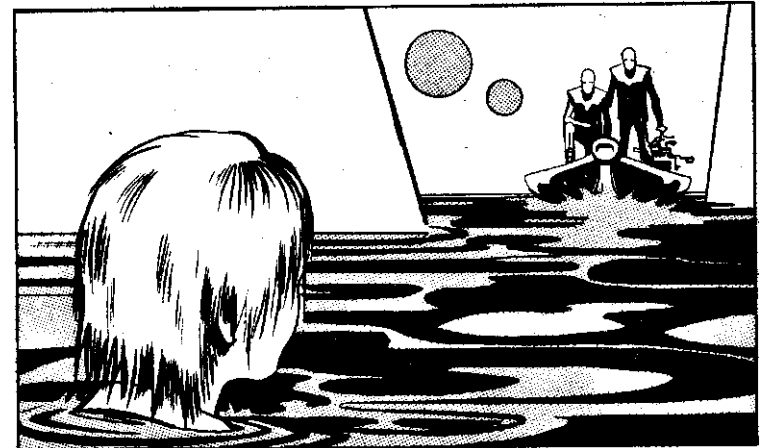
If you let the Mungoid force you into The Cosmic Funhouse, turn to page 9.

"May I make a suggestion, Boss?" asks Tor. "We might want to send for a xenologist"

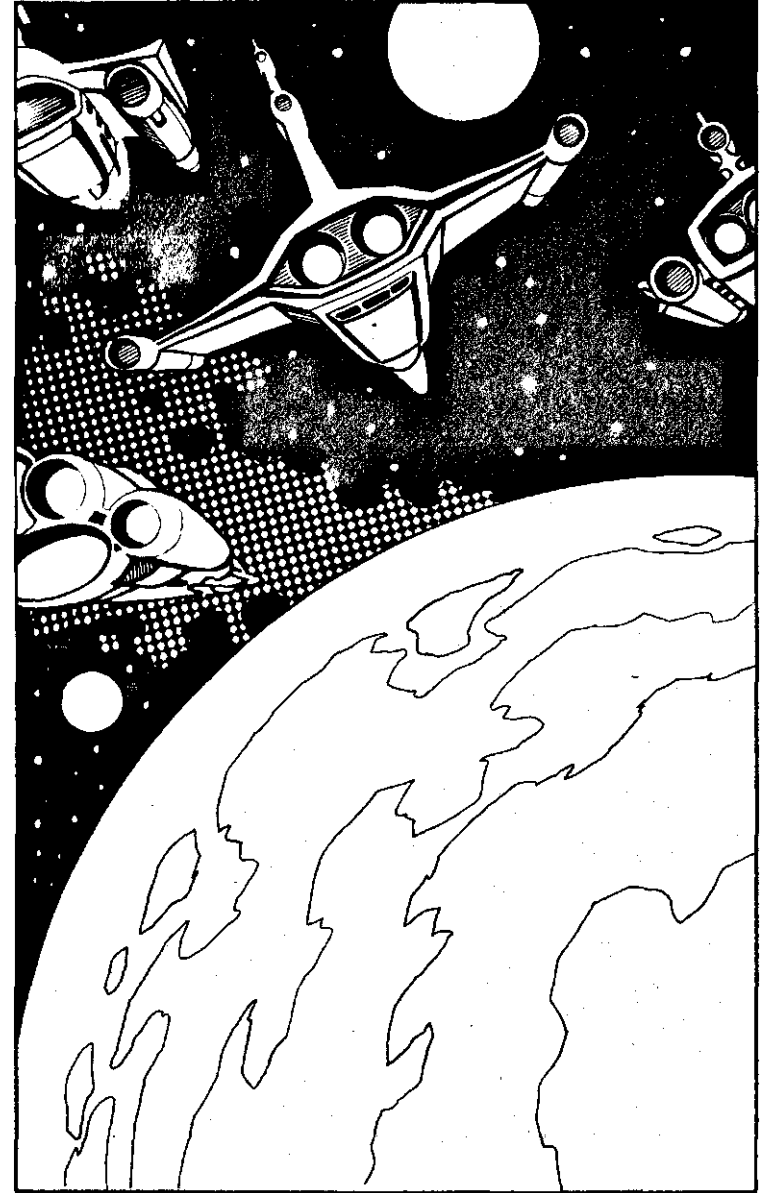
"A xe-what?" you repeat.

In desperation, you get an idea. The rides! You can use one to escape.

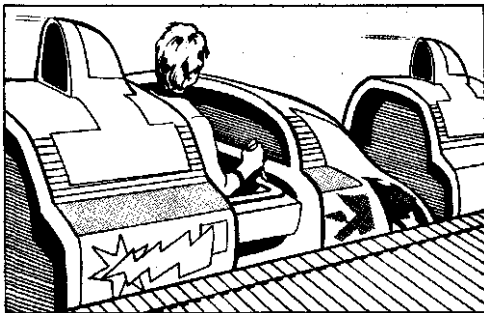
The Rocket Ride has just loaded up, and it's already moving. You climb on. It cannonballs into the air, gathering speed.

If you go back for 2-Tor, turn to page 14.

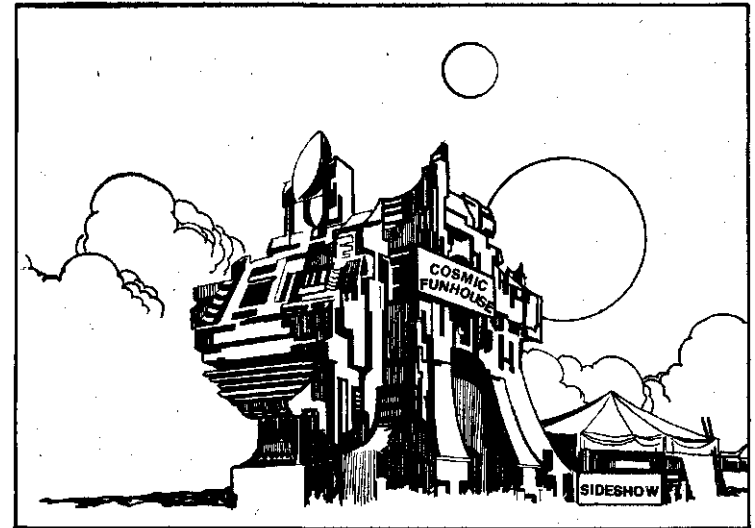

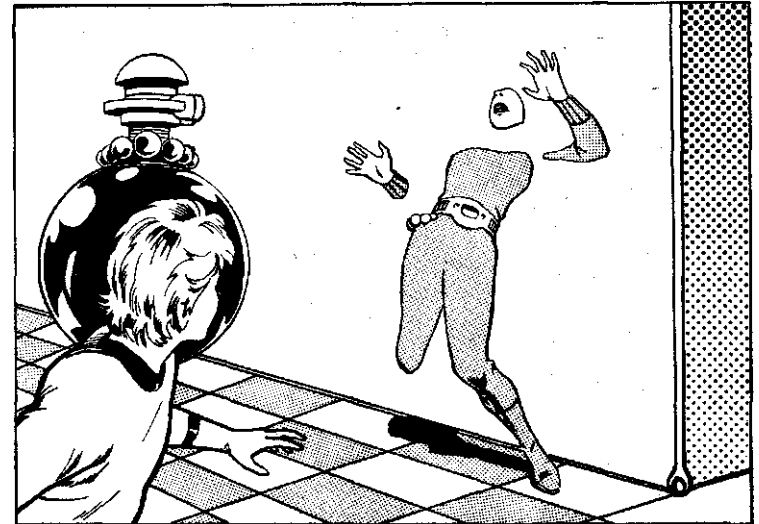
What action can you think of? You end up roaming the corridors of the funhouse, banging on walls and kicking in doors.

"Have fun?" asks the alien pleasantly.

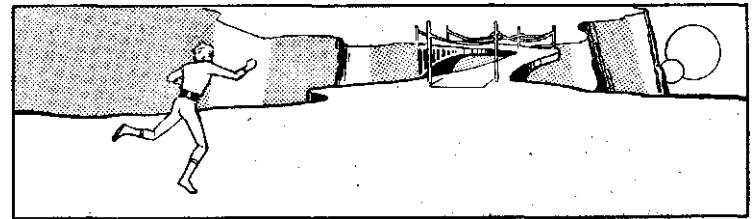
"Fun!" you screech. "I could have gotten *killed* back there!"

"Perhaps it's just visiting," says 2-Tor.

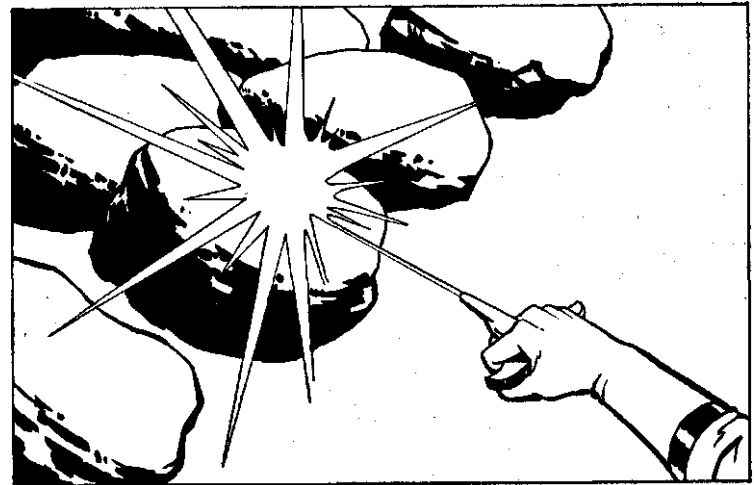
"Maybe this planet's made of green cheese, too."

You take the direct approach. "How do I know she's real?" you ask the Brakhen.

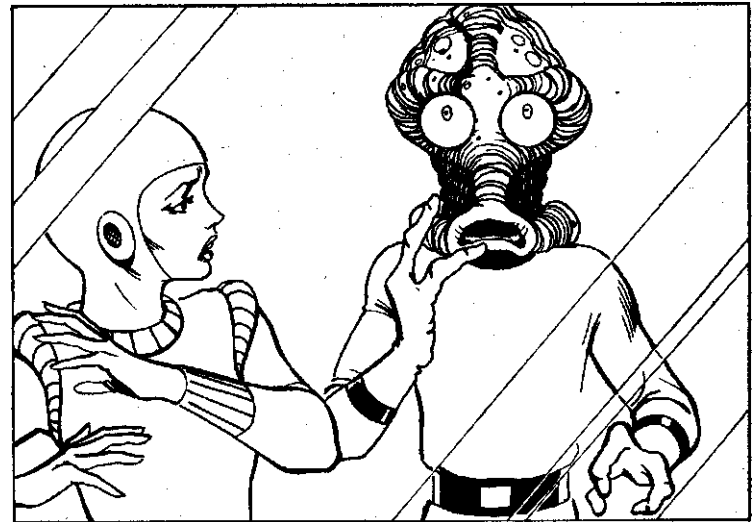
"Who knows what is real?" it responds.

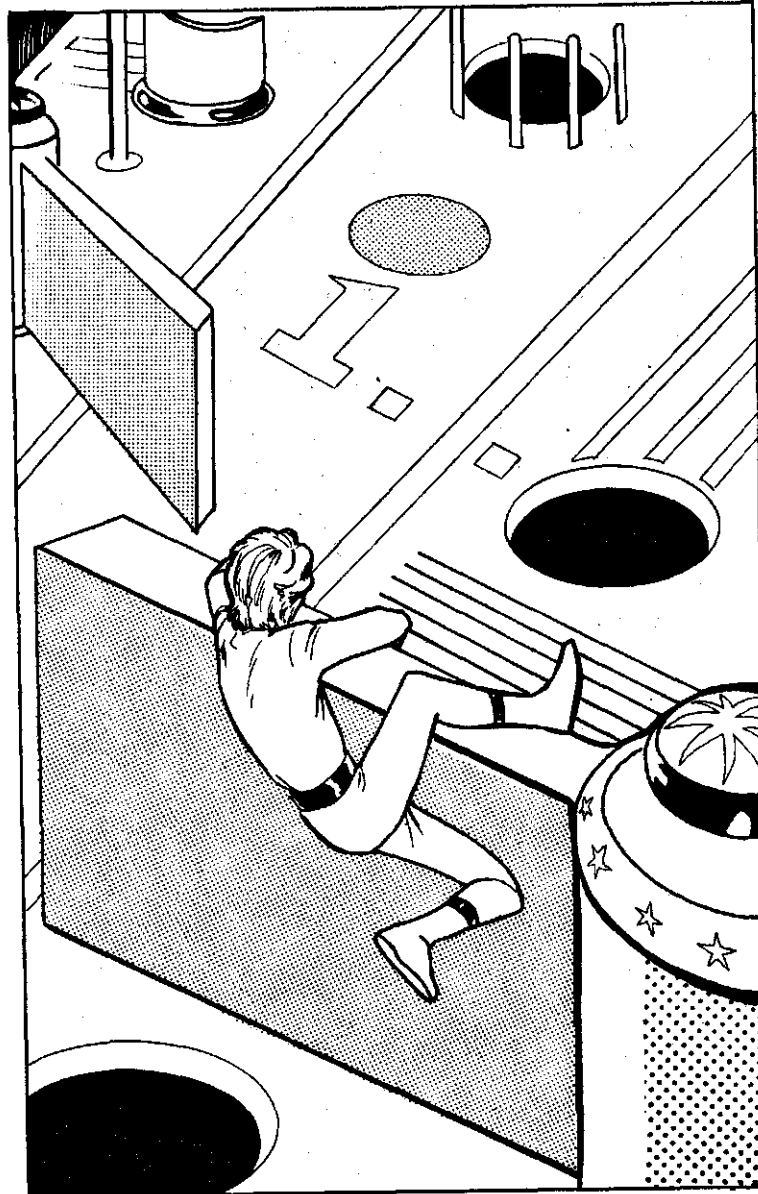

"2-Tor, can you talk to this thing?" you shout.

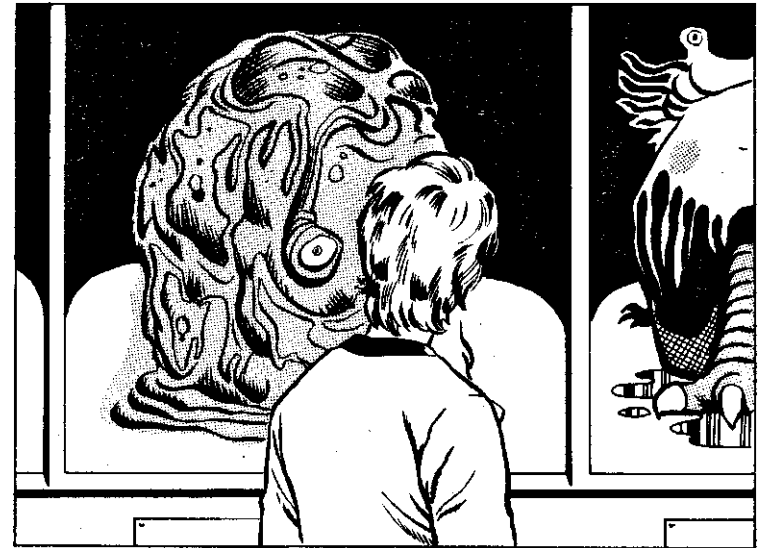

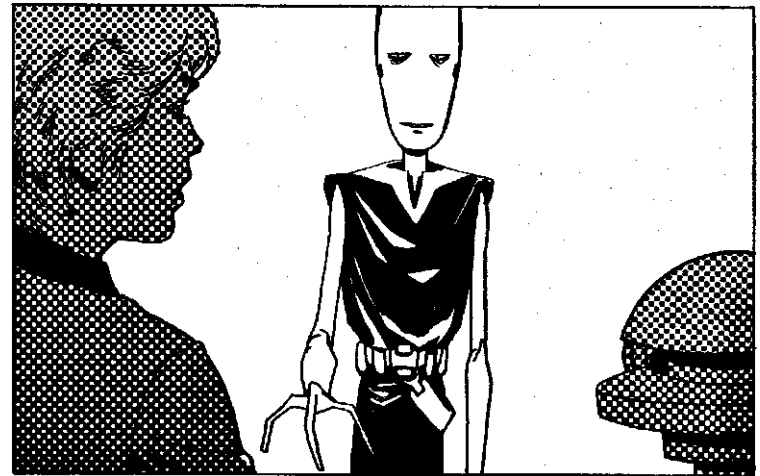
But it doesn't seem to want to hurt you. In fact, it seems quite friendly. It even speaks your language.

As soon as you get outside, she whips out a pulser and blasts you.

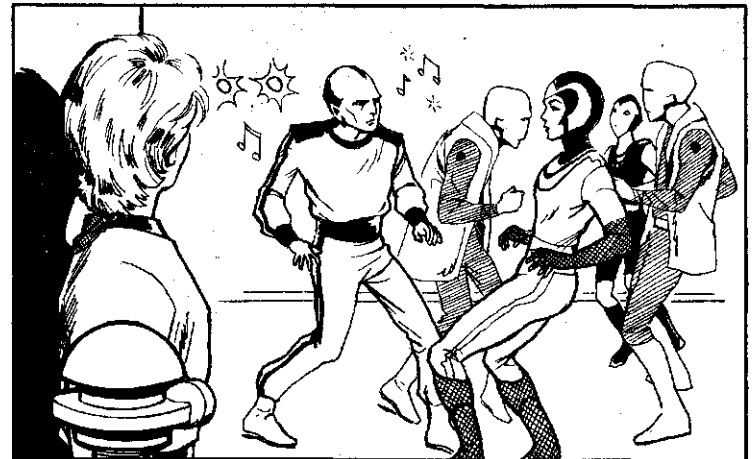

The next thing you're aware of is a deep and mighty rumble from the guts of the Amusement Planet. It's taking off!

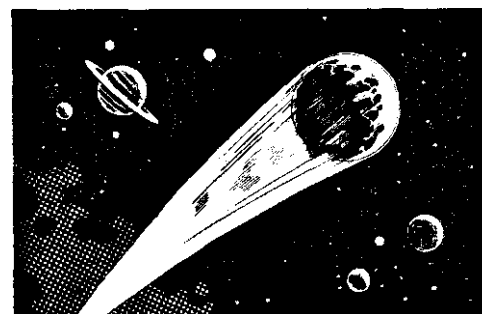
You and 2-Tor put it together at the same time: The whole planet is a gigantic warship. And you're going for a ride.

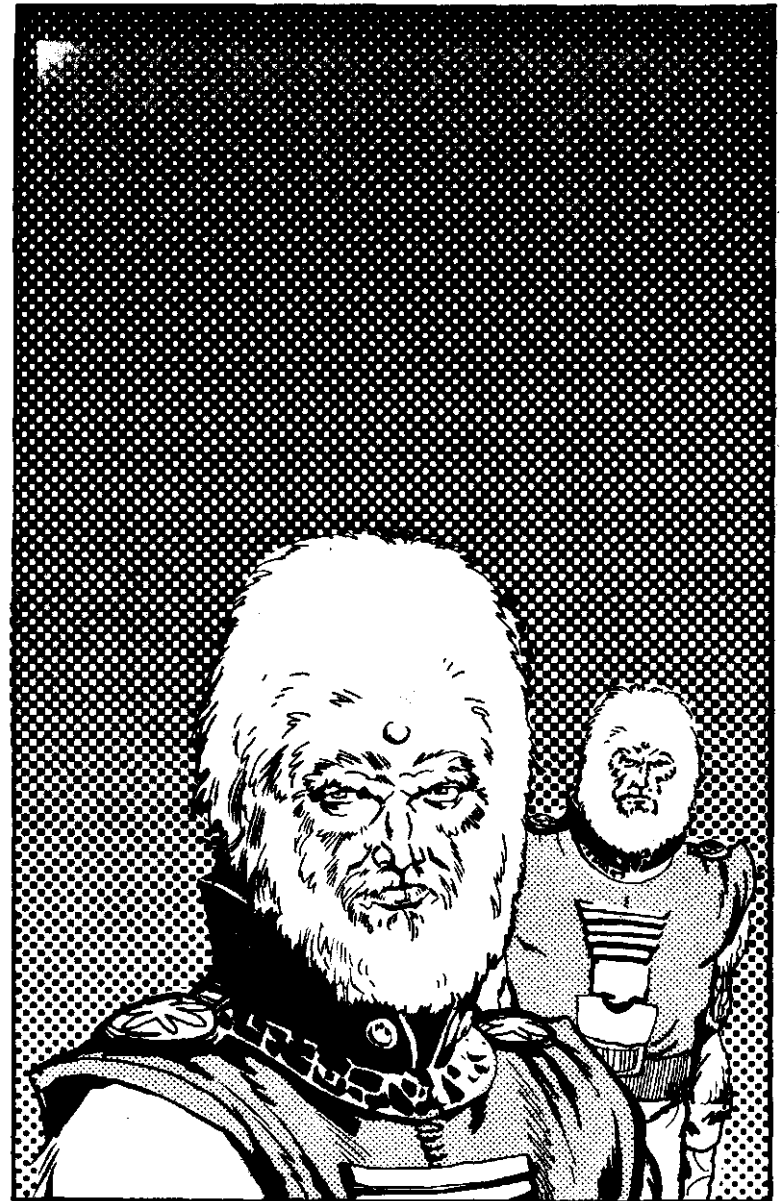

"I switched to auto-repair," he says. "Need some help here, Boss?"

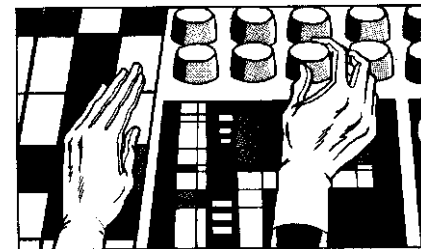

Everyone is crowding into a pack at the center of the room. You feel a strong need to join the others.

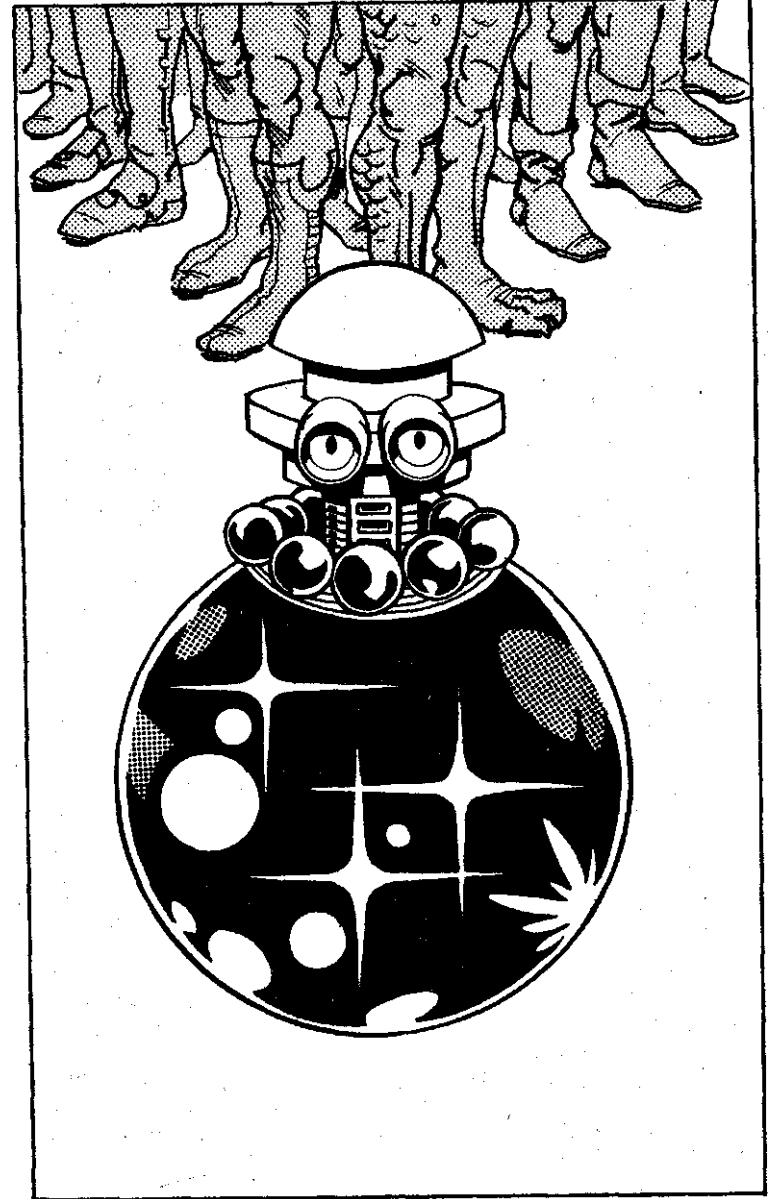
"Tor, I just have to go in there for a minute. It's important."

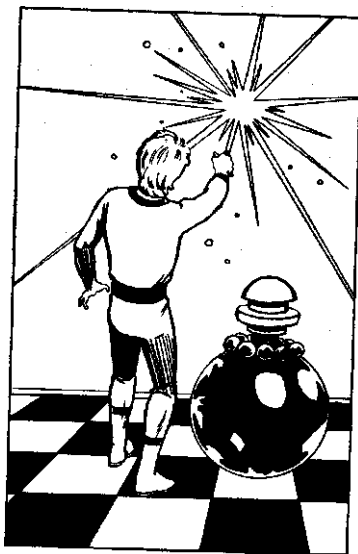

You try to move closer to the machine. The floor is moving in waves, and it's slow going.

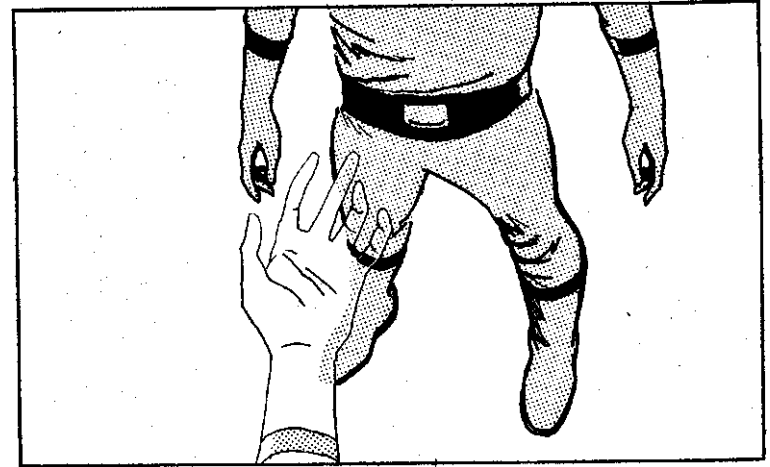
"Who are you?" you whisper in horror.

You look down at yourself. You're growing transparent. Your mind is getting blanker. You have to kill this hideous imitation of yourself. And you don't have much time.

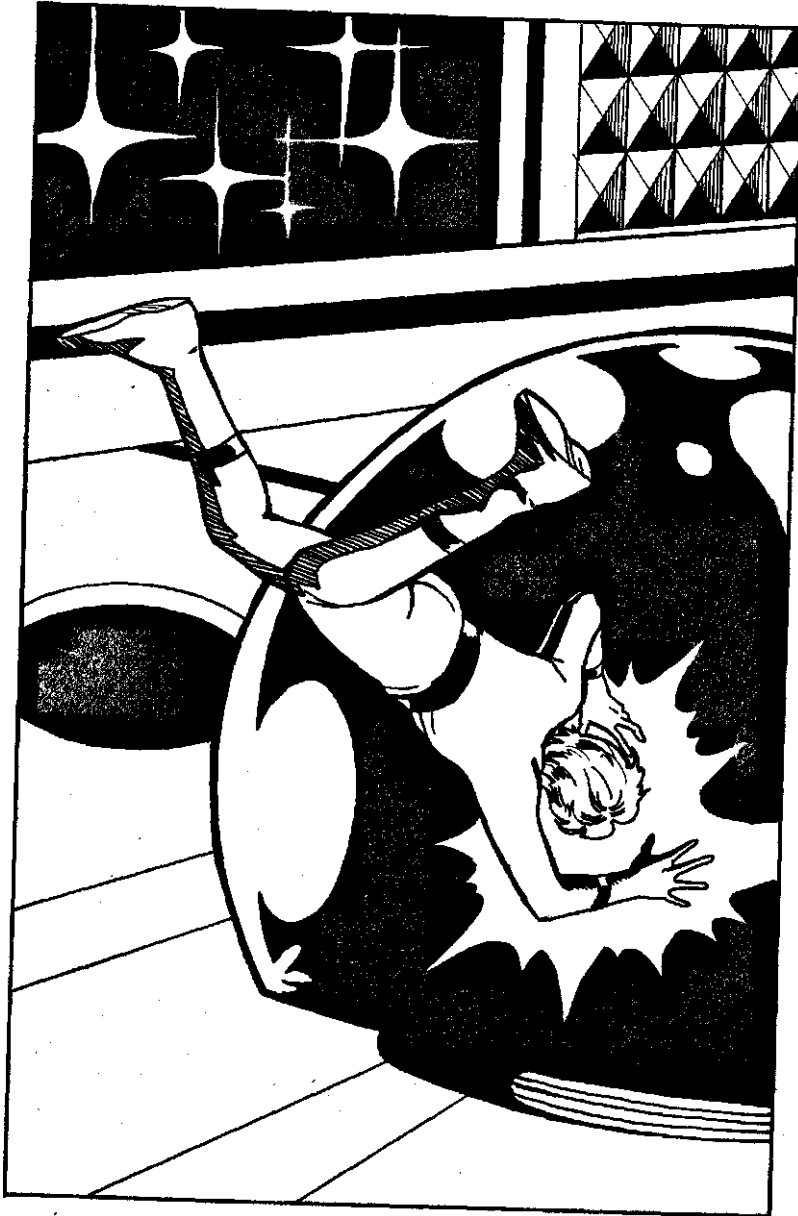
You want to strangle it with your bare hands. You're not sure your pulser will have any effect on it.

Protected by your bio-support suit, you wander this lifeless planet with 2-Tor. "I don't think there's any life here," you say at last. "This must have been a mistake."

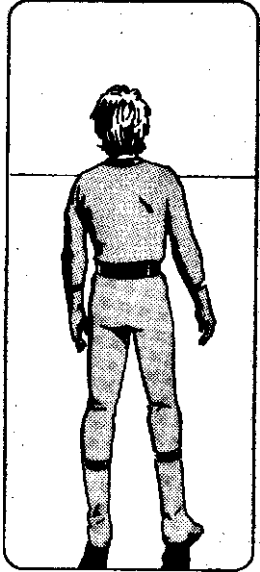

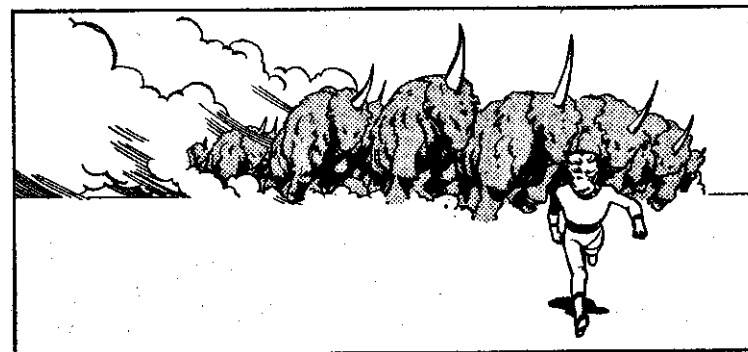
Your ears pick up a faint sound, coming from your left. A low whistling noise.

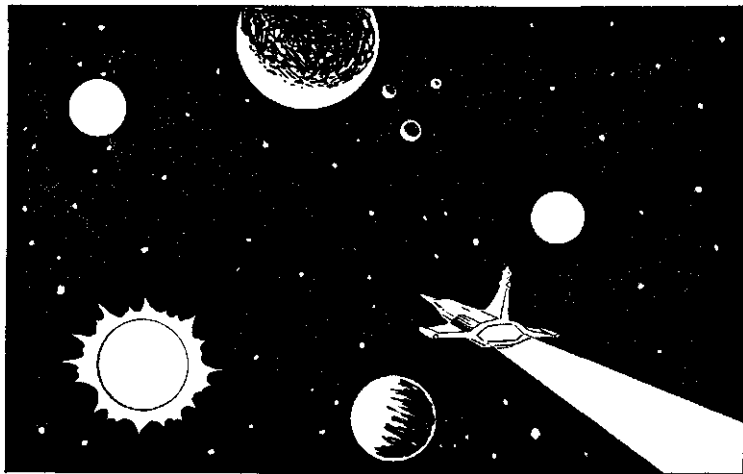

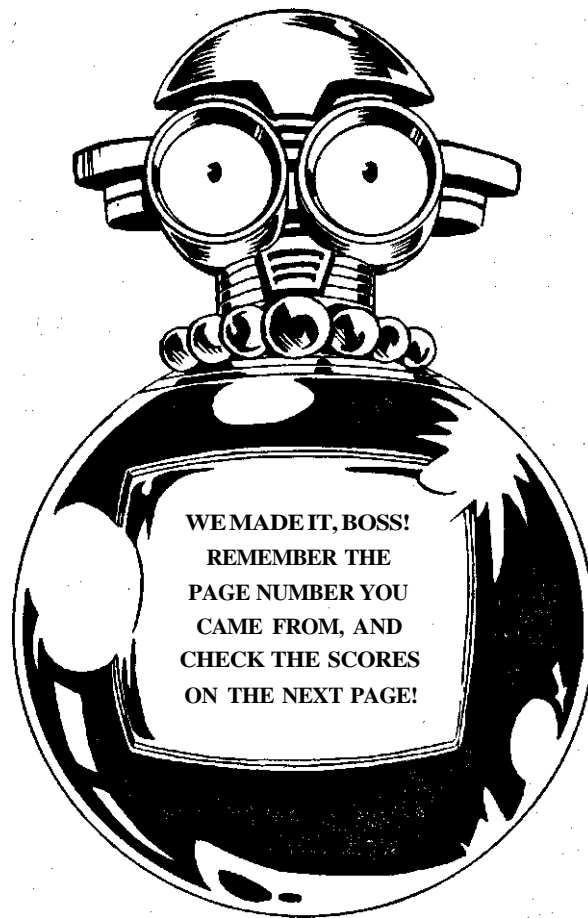
